I. CALL TO ORDER

The Board of Selectmen (BOS) meeting was called to order at 7:09 P.M. by First Selectman Spielman.

B. April 16, 2018 Regular Board of Selectmen Meeting

MOVED (TURNER), SECONDED (STAVENS) AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY TO APPROVE THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN REGULAR MEETING MINUTES OF APRIL 16, 2018.

V. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Request for Leave of Absence: Todd Harmon, Police Officer

MOVED (TURNER), SECONDED (COOK) AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY TO GRANT TODD HARMON A ONE YEAR LEAVE OF ABSENCE FROM HIS POSITION AS POLICE OFFICER EFFECTIVE MAY 14, 2018, AS PERMITTED BY SGT. BRIAN SANTA.

VI. NEW BUSINESS

A. Tax Refunds/Abatements

MOVED (TURNER), SECONDED (STAVENS) AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY TO APPROVE THE TAX REFUNDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,980.57 AS RECOMMENDED BY THE TAX & REVENUE COLLECTOR AND AS SPECIFIED IN THE REFUNDS/ABATEMENTS STATEMENT DATED MAY, 2018. [ATTACHED]

B. Parachute Activity at Ellington Airport/Annual Review

The documentation from the Connecticut Parachutists has not been received in full. Julia Connor is checking with the State to determine what is required compared to what has been provided.

Mr. Turner stated he doesn't believe they should let this go. The item should be tabled until they receive the requested complete incident report.

This item was tabled until next meeting.

C. Re-establish Ad Hoc Crystal Lake Milfoil Committee

MOVED (TURNER), SECONDED (STOMBERG) AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY TO RE-ESTABLISH THE AD HOC CRYSTAL LAKE MILFOIL COMMITTEE FOR ONE YEAR TO MAY 31, 2019.

D. Ellington Volunteer Ambulance Corps Ambulance – Award Bid

MOVED (TURNER), SECONDED (COOK) AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY TO APPROVE AN ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION IN THE AMOUNT OF \$9,632 FROM THE 2017-2018 UNASSIGNED FUND BALANCE TO THE APPROVED 2015-2016 CAPITAL NON-RECURRING FUND FOR THE EVAC REPLACEMENT AMBULANCE PROJECT OF \$210,000; TOTAL COST OF PROJECT IS \$219,632, WHICH WILL BE REIMBURSED BY THE EVAC CHARGING FUND. FURTHER, TO HOLD A SPECIAL TOWN MEETING ON JUNE 11, 2018 AT 7:00 P.M. PREVAILING TIME AT THE ELLINGTON TOWN HALL MEETING HALL FOR THE PURPOSE OF ALLOWING CITIZENS TO DISCUSS AND VOTE ON THIS ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION.

Mr. Turner asked about the submitted bid proposals. Ms. Spielman responded that there was only one. The specifications were broadly written and only one company showed up to the pre-bid meeting. Mr. Hany, Ellington Volunteer Ambulance Corporation (EVAC) President, stated

that he called around to inform multiple companies of the pre-bid meeting. Eastford Fire Rescue was the only one that showed up.

Mr. Turner expressed his disappointment that there was only one offer received, and that there was no additional correspondence from the companies that did not show up to bid. He also shared his feelings that it appears as if different agencies are treated differently in how specifications are reviewed and how the process goes.

Mr. Hany responded that this has been a long process. He created a new bid packet that Ms. Spielman reviewed before it was put out to bid.

Ms. Cook asked for clarification. Mr. Turner responded that there was a substantially different process for the procedure to purchase the new fire trucks. Ms. Cook asked how the pre-bid process was advertised. Mr. Hany responded that it was advertised in the Journal Inquirer. Mr. Hany also stated that the ambulance comes at no cost to the tax payers. It will be bought with the money from the EVAC charging fund, which helps to buy larger items and offset the operating cost of EVAC.

Mr. Turner asked what will happen to the old vehicle. Mr. Hany stated that they would call ASM, who needs larger ambulances for bariatric patients. If they don't want it, it could go to auction or the Town could dispose of it as they wish.

MOVED (TURNER), SECONDED (COOK) AND PASSED (AYE: PRICHARD, STAVENS, STOMBERG, FERRY, COOK; ABSTAIN: TURNER) TO AWARD THE BID FOR THE 2018 ELLINGTON VOLUNTEER AMBULANCE CORPS (EVAC) AMBULANCE TO EASTFORD FIRE AND RESCUE SALES, INC. OF EASTFORD, CT IN THE AMOUNT OF \$219,632. FURTHER, TO AUTHORIZE THE FIRST SELECTMAN TO SIGN THE CONTRACT, PENDING BOARD OF FINANCE AND TOWN MEETING APPROVAL.

Mr. Stavens asked for the year and mileage of the vehicle. Mr. Hany responded that it is a 2010 with 90,000 miles on it.

Ms. Spielman asked Mr. Turner how the process should change in the future. Mr. Turner said that he thinks the process needs to be reviewed so that everyone complies with the financial guidelines of the Charter.

Mr. Turner asked if they have looked at used or demo vehicles. Mr. Hany stated that this ambulance will be equivalent to what they have now, with the same inside compartments. If they were to purchase a demo, they would have saved only \$5,000.

E. Town Newsletter/Magazine - Vendor and Advertising Option

Ms. Spielman stated that she and her staff are having a hard time finding a vendor to publish the Town Magazine. They can piggyback onto one out of Enfield. She doesn't want to pay to do it, as there are many businesses in Town that are happy to advertise. She is asking for permission to go this route. Mr. Turner stated that in the past this product has been informative for residents. It would be nice to continue with an affordable, quality product. It is nice to have local vendors that have been supportive and have advertised, and hopefully they have benefited from that as well.

MOVED (TURNER), SECONDED (STAVENS) AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY TO AUTHORIZE THE FIRST SELECTMAN TO ASSIST THE PROPOSED VENDOR, WICKED GOOD NEWS, WITH THE SOLICITATION OF ADVERTISING FOR THE TOWN OF ELLINGTON NEWSLETTER IN ORDER TO DEFRAY THE COST TO THE TOWN FOR PROVIDING THIS PUBLICATION TO THE RESIDENTS.

Ms. Cook asked if there were any other vendors that were looked at. Ms. Spielman stated that there are very few out there. Wicked Good News puts out a quality magazine and will also get to all the P.O. boxes, which the last vendor would not do. Ms. Spielman said that they can try this and see how it goes- they can leave if they don't like it.

F. DPW Week Proclamation/Fill-a-Truck/Open House

Mr. Webb said that National Public Works Week runs from May 20-26. DPW will hold its Annual Open House on May 24. They will be trying to fill a truck by collecting various non-perishable goods for the Ellington Food Pantry.

G. Elderly and Disabled Demand Response Municipal Grant –
Maintenance of Effort and Grant Assignment

MOVED (TURNER), SECONDED (FERRY) AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY TO ADOPT THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION:

BE IT RESOLVED THAT NICHOLAS J. DICORLETO, JR., FINANCE OFFICER/TREASURER OF THE TOWN OF ELLINGTON, IS AUTHORIZED TO SIGN AND EXECUTE THE MAINTENANCE OF EFFORT CERTIFICATION DOCUMENT ON BEHALF OF THE TOWN OF ELLINGTON WITH THE STATE OF CONNECTICUT DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, RELATING TO THE GRANT PROGRAM FOR ELDERLY AND DISABLED DEMAND RESPONSIVE TRANSPORTATION (DIAL-A-RIDE SERVICES) FOR 2019.

Joy Hollister said that this is the third year of this grant. They are asking for maintenance of effort, which Mr. DiCorleto has signed. Next year will require the full grant application.

H. Ordinance: Chapter 10. Alcoholic Beverages

Sgt. Santa stated that he looked at some other towns that have really strong ordinances and wrote a draft to bring to the Ordinance Committee for review. If they are going to move forward with the Town citations, the ordinances have to be cleaned up. The citation amount is just a reference. The ordinance should now mirror the current State statute, which requires a local appeals process.

Ms. Cook asked who the \$100 citation amount would go back to. Sgt. Santa responded that it would go to the Town.

MOVED (TURNER), SECONDED (COOK) AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY TO REFER TO THE BOS ORDINANCE COMMITTEE THE PROPOSAL FOR REVISIONS TO ORDINANCE CHAPTER 10. ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES, AS PROPOSED BY SGT. BRIAN SANTA, RESIDENT STATE TROOPERS' SUPERVISOR, AND FOR THE BOS ORDINANCE COMMITTEE TO STUDY THIS PROPOSAL AND TO MAKE A RECOMMENDATION TO THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN.

I. Authorization to Fill Deputy Tax & Revenue Collector Position

MOVED (TURNER), SECONDED (FERRY) AND PASSED UNANIMOUSLY TO AUTHORIZE THE FIRST SELECTMAN TO FILL THE DEPUTY TAX & REVENUE COLLECTOR VACANCY, CREATED BY THE RESIGNATION OF HEIDI TUCKER.

J. DPW Superintendent of Operations Position

The BOS will discuss in open session the proposal to add the DPW Superintendent of Operations position. They will go into Executive Session when discussing the document from the Labor Attorney.

Mr. Webb stated that the Foreman, Lenny Descheneaux, may retire soon. Instead of filling that position, he would like to create a Superintendent of Operations position that would work to sustain the future of the DPW. Currently, the Foreman position is a unionized position, which makes it difficult to discipline the other employees. He would not eliminate the Foreman position; it would just not be filled.

Mr. Turner asked where the line is drawn between the management and hands on portion of the job. Mr. Webb stated that the person in the new position would have the ability to attend nightly meetings in place of him, but would not do things such as plow. It is more of a managerial position and it would be classified as exempt.

Mr. Stavens asked what Mr. Descheneaux does currently, besides plowing. Mr. Webb responded that it depends on what job needs to be done and the staffing available.

Ms. Cook asked what the current volume of discipline is. Mr. Webb responded that there overall has been minimal discipline required. In the past year, one employee was suspended, and none have been terminated. When discipline occurs, Human Resources and Mr. Webb are involved.

Mr. Webb said no vehicle will be provided for this new position. There will be no changes to the Assistant Foreman position. They will not need another secretary for the additional management level position, and they will not need another office to use. No person in the current staff will be ruled out of the potential for promotion to this position.

Peg Busse (37 Abbott Rd) asked who will pick up the slack of the hands-on things that the current Foreman does. Mr. Webb responded that the present Foreman spends minimal time doing hands-on activity. He is not assigned a plow route, but he will go out and check. He occasionally plows. The new person's position would have to be outlined by the Union. This is all just a preliminary idea.

Ms. Cook stated that she understands the need for management, and agrees that it is difficult to discipline unionized staff. However, if the volume of discipline is so small, she is not sure about the need to pay the additional dollars if the role is being accomplished between Human Resources and Mr. Webb already.

Shawn Bull (8 Penfield Avenue) stated that Mr. Descheneaux plows every storm and is hands-on all the time. He is called a lot and is an intricate and important part of the team. He is not sure what the job description of this position is or what the requirements are, but he feels that many people would like to move up in the department but cannot.

Kevin Gambacorta (244 Mountain Street) said that he is the Assistant Foreman. Mr. Descheneaux is very hands-on. He aspires to take his position one day. They don't need another office person, they need hands-on people. He is afraid that this job will not be available to one of the current staff, or that they will not qualify for it. They need someone who has worked here and understands the Town if they're going to lead Public Works.

Joshua Hebert (15 Lanz Lane) agrees with Mr. Bull and Mr. Gambacorta. He has been with the Town for almost twenty years and they need people helping with the work and people who know what is going on. He feels like the position would eliminate the current employees from being eligible.

Mr. Turner asked when the Foreman position comes up for negotiations with the Union. Marie Sauve, Human Resources Coordinator/Executive Assistant, responded that negotiations will start in January 2019. Technically, this position should not be in the Union.

Mr. Stavens asked the people who spoke if they understand that this is a working supervisor position, but that it should not be. Mr. Hebert responded that Mr. Descheneaux is a disciplinary figure. Mr. Gambacorta said that if someone is doing something unsafe, they are told and they have enough respect to follow that advice.

The BOS moved on from the topic at this time, to revisit it in Executive Session at the end of the meeting.

The Budget Referendum is May 15, 2018 from 6 am to 8 pm at the Senior Center.

The next Community Voice Channel guest is Stephen Schirra, a 2010 graduate of Ellington High School and 2014 UConn graduate. He founded a non-profit called Around the Worlds Around the World. His first program was held in 2015 in Peru. He has since traveled to over twenty countries, running soccer programs for underprivileged children. He holds skills clinics and provides soccer balls for the kids. Stephen has been recognized by Major League Soccer and the Boston Celtics for his work.

There was a great attendance for the Earth Day event. Next year the Committee is going to start planning earlier in the year.

Crumbling Foundations Update: Ms. Spielman is working with the Town of Vernon on applying for a grant. Congressman Joe Courtney and IRS Senior Stakeholder Joseph McCarthy hosted a seminar on the IRS Casualty Loss deduction and the crisis of deteriorating residential concrete foundations on Saturday, May 12 at the high school.

Northern CT Radio Club located at 200 Green Road is having several events:

Hall Memorial Library collects old phones, used ink cartridges and eyeglasses.

Ellington Senior Center now has 699 members. There are 89 new members since last year. Ms. Spielman expressed thanks to Joy Hollister and Erin Graziani.

The Memorial Day Parade is Monday, May 28, 2018

- Crystal Lake: 9:00 A.M.- At approximately 9:00 A.M. a parade will begin from the Crystal Lake section of Town, where Green Street intersects with Route 140, and end at the Crystal Lake Cemetery where a brief service will be held.

Ellington Center: 10:30 A.M. - Services will be held at 10:30 A.M. at the Ellington High School. At the conclusion of the program (approximately 11:30 A.M.), a parade will begin from Ellington High School and proceed to the Ellington Green and then to the Ellington Cemetery for brief memorial tributes at each location.

The hold harmless language requested from the Town Attorney was received regarding the Bill of Sale for used equipment. Ms. Spielman said that the fire departments are aware in case they sell something, and they will turn in receipts.

Melinda LaBruna resigned from her Senior Center Van Driver position and accepted the Assessment Aide position in the Assessor's Office.

Mary DiBenedetto, Food Bank Aide, submitted her letter of resignation in March. However, Joy Hollister has reported that Ms. DiBenedetto has agreed to continue in her position.

Ms. Spielman stated that there is a letter from Ron Blanchette (74 Kibbe Rd), who owns the land with the entrance going into the State road off Kibbe Road. Ms. Spielman already checked into purchasing the property with Lisa Houlihan, and the price was too high at that time.

Mr. Turner noted that the letter referenced the erosion, destruction, and littering of the trails. Financially, it would be difficult to police this, especially on State property. There is also reference to the right of having this road open up based on past practice. This has been sent to the Attorney General.

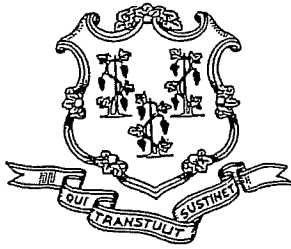

Subject: Traffic Control Requirements

Ma'am,

Due to recent events and in consultation with Director of Public Works Timothy Webb, I have identified the need for traffic control requirements in Ellington. Similar requirements have been put in place by surrounding municipalities. The below outlines my recommended requirements:

- A. When excavation, construction or repair of or on any public roadway, street or sidewalk or the destruction of any building within the Town of Ellington, (herein after referred to as "repair work") creates or may create a hazard or inconvenience to vehicular or pedestrian traffic or in a way causes or may cause a hazard to the public safety, the Resident State Trooper Supervisor, Director of Public Works or Director of Land Use may

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direct the person(s) so engaged to provide uniformed Police Officers, Certified Flaggers or appropriate barricades with barricade warning lights.

- B. This rule REQUIRES the use of uniformed Police Officers for traffic control on the following roads:
- Route 286
 - Route 140
 - Route 83
 - Route 74
 - Route 30
 - Jobs Hill Road
 - Hoffman Road
 - Frog Hollo Road
 - Upper/Middle/Lower Butcher Roads
 - Egypt Road
 - Windermere Avenue
 - Windsorville Road
 - Abbott Road
 - Meadow Brook Road
 - Muddy Brook Road
 - Ellington Avenue
 - Pinnacle Road
 - Additional roads may be included/added at the discretion of the Ellington Resident State Trooper Supervisor
- C. The Ellington Resident State Trooper Supervisor may require that the person(s) engaged in the repair work first utilize uniformed Police Officers of the Ellington Resident Troopers Office. The expense of such police protection shall be paid by the entity engaged in such repair work at rates determined by the Town of Ellington. If Ellington Police Officers are unavailable, the entity will be required to contact the State Police Special Duty Office to request State Troopers for police protection. The expense of this protection provided by State Troopers shall be paid and coordinated through the State Police Special Duty Office.
- D. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this rule, any repair work performed by the Connecticut Department of Transportation, the Town of Ellington or any of its offices or agents, or initiated by the Town of Ellington or any of its offices or agents, may utilize

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properly equipped and trained Municipal employees or agents of the Municipality as
Flaggers.
